EXERCUTIVE SUMMARY

The Quality Assurance Department of the National Teachers' Institute moved off to monitor and evaluate the standards and quality in the conduct of 2019 second semester examination. Fifteen (15) Internal and eight (8) external quality assessors were nominated to monitor, assess and evaluate the conduct of the examination nationwide from, 29th November to 21th December, 2019. Questionnaire and interview with face validity by external assessors from conventional Universities within the country were utilized as instrument for data collection. As a means of procedure for data collection; the internal quality assessors visited all the examination centers in the state(s) assigned, while external assessors visited at least 30% of the examination centers nationwide through random sampling. They administered the questionnaire within the time frame of twenty-five (25) days. The scoring was on scale of 1 to 2 i.e. Yes or No; Available or Not Available, Adequate or Inadequate. The collected data was analyzed and presented using descriptive statistics i.e. frequency distribution tables were employed in the analysis. The assessment of the charts and comments related to performance indicators were made on each category. The analyzed data proved the fact that there was a remarkable improvement in the conduct of second semester examination 2019 over that of first semester 2019. The trend in the general results showed that preparations for the examinations, conduct and supervision of the examinations were very good and need to be commended. While it can be said that even though the environment of the examinations were not totally bad, they were not as resounding as the success in the preparation, conduct and supervision of the examinations. This was the result that played out even in the State-by-State analysis that was done. Finally, it was recommended that the Institute should try and implement or execute the suggestions made at the end of the report. This is necessary in order to improve on the quality of subsequent examinations.

1.0 INTRODUCTION:

Quality Assurance and ICT Department of the National Teachers' Institute is saddled with the responsibility of assessing, monitoring, evaluation and proffering appropriate suggestions for the enhancement and improvement of the institutes' activities for optimal performance. Based on the above, the department deployed internal and external assessors to ensure compliance to standards for the successful conduct of second semester 2019. The aim of the monitoring and evaluation exercise is to ascertain the standards and quality of the 2nd semester examination, while the specific objectives are to:

- find out the extent to which preparation for the examination was made
- investigate the extent to which examination environments were conducive
- observe the conduct of the examination
- investigate the extent to which the examination was adequately supervised

3.0 METHOD OF DATA COLLECTION

In line with the above objectives, fifteen (15) members of staff of the Institute and eight (8) External Quality Assurance Assessors were assigned to monitor, assess and evaluate the conduct of 2019 second Semester Examination exercise nationwide from 29th November to 21st December, 2019 using an evaluation checklist – category A to E (item 1 to 27) as yardstick. Also, interviews were held with some individuals and small group of students to have an insight into certain practices. Such interviews were guided by a set of generally agreed to and broad questions.

4.0 DATA ANALYSIS METHOD


The methods used in the Data Analysis are:

An evaluation checklist on five categories was administered on the four (4) different programmes: BDPs, PGDE, NCE and PTTC during the examination period. In each case, the Quality Assurance Officers responded to items in the checklist. The scoring was on scale of 1 to 2 i.e. Yes or No; Available or Not Available, Adequate or Inadequate. The assessment of the charts and comments related to performance indicators was made on each category.




FIGURE 2: CHART OF PERFORMANCE INDICATORS ON EXAMS ENVIRONMENT







Other observations

- Not all the academic programmes are being run at NCE and DEGREE levels in various centers
- The P.G.D.E enrolment in all the states in the South-East is no longer encouraging
- The lumping of two or more courses as one paper should be stopped.
- Late release of results was echoed in all the centres visited.
- Anything relating to these programmes should follow all the activities taking place in the regular academic institutions to avoid disparity in the quality of service delivery and certificate.
- The conduct of the examinations at this time was perfect. I commend the NTI management for ensuring that the internal members of staff were in charge.
- The Management of NTI should, please, reconsider the remuneration of EQAAs for upward review. The present remuneration is no longer enough to cover our **transport**, **accommodation**, **feeding** and other **contingencies**.
- The quality of the questions in terms of content and language was perfect
- The standard of questions and the marking schemes should be maintained to ensure further quality.
